Establishing reflective learning practices to minimise student AI dependence Miriam Salim, Humber Polytechnic, Canada

The release of ChatGPT and other subsequent text-generative Als has greatly influenced academic integrity and student learning. As a Canadian college writing professor interested in establishing welcoming learning spaces, I focus more on centring and amplifying student voices in the classroom rather than on punishing Al use. Text-generative Al responds to prompts in a formulaic manner, showcasing white, male, and liberal writing which is not representative of many students' authentic voice. Assisting students in finding their own writing style and developing a sense of self promotes student agency (Thaiss & Zawacki, 2006) and is the main aim of reflective writing practices. Considering our current academic landscape, I've incorporated a variety of reflective skill building exercises in my classes to encourage authentic writing and critical thinking...

Artificial Intelligence and academic integrity: Do Al detectors work? Adrian Anderson, University of South Carolina, USA

As a conduct administrator whose primary duties are adjudicating alleged violations of the Honor Code, understanding how artificial intelligence is being used by college students to aid in the completion of the work has become a primary responsibility. Since the fall semester of 2022 when ChatGPT became more accessible, students have found creative means to use AI to enhance their work or complete it entirely. A common question I receive is "Do you use AI Detectors?". The answer is yes and no.

The Problem with Detection Software

Facutly and students quickly adopted the use of artificial intelligence detectors such as ChatGPT Zero to use as evidence proving a written assignment was likely generated by artificial intelligence or by a human. When cases started coming to our office and a professor had already told a student they used a detector, and this was the cause for the report, students who wanted to fight the allegation would find other detectors that said the opposite...

ICAI-Canada Day – Thriving with Integrity: No Apologies Needed (But we will say sorry anyway)!

On March 5, 2025, ICAI-Canada brought together 27 Canadian educators, staff, academic integrity specialists. and administrators in Chicago for a full day dedicated to advancing academic integrity, as a powerful testament to our shared commitment across Canadian educational institutions to uphold and strengthen integrity in education. The day opened with a dynamic panel, facilitated by Josh Seeland, featuring experts from kindergarten to grade 12. college, and university sectors, who explored national challenges and opportunities, offering diverse perspectives on fostering integrity across educational levels. Their insights underscored the importance of a unified, crossdepartmental approach to academic integrity (Panel Members - Myke Healy, Naomi Paisley, Iryna Pavlova, Robyn Joffe). Angela Clark, Vice-Chair of ICAI-Canada, shared findings from her recent study at York University which emphasized the critical role of research in shaping effective integrity practices.

Four presentations showcased innovative strategies and best practices currently in place (Angela Clark-York University, Jennie Miron-Humber Polytechnic, Nilgün Onder-University of Regina, Iryna Pavlova-Sheridan College), followed by engaging 'hot topic table talks'. Despite all challenges, our shared commitment to fostering a culture of integrity remains unwavering.

Have you been following the news stories about integrity? Here's our main news story by Joseph Brown, Colorado State University:

Much discussion this month focused on James Walsh's recent article in **New York Magazine**. "Everyone is Cheating Their Way Through **College.**" Arriving just before many institutions led into finals, it profiled one student who was committed to unethical uses of AI, first in cheating through university work, and subsequently through the development of a business model leveraging AI for puerile private and professional gains. The article joined a chorus of others from the last two years ostensibly designed to raise the specter of how much academic work is being completed authentically in our classrooms. It's a good reminder that the public continues to drift through a cycle of ignorance, engagement, astonishment, despair, overreaction, and disengagement (again and again). Reactions to the article followed predictable patterns as well. Gen AI polemicists seized on the opportunity to decry the slide of critical thinking and student learning while AI enthusiasts enjoyed having a good foil to attack on their way to preaching a gospel of adoption. As integrity professionals, we owe it to our

As integrity professionals, we owe it to our institutions to be a voice of moderation, separated from this dysfunctional cycle and dedicated to engendering a better conversation. While teaching and learning conversations evolve on the issue, we can encourage academic leaders, faculty, and the public that supports us to have a conversation with their local integrity professional Helping those that fund our institutions and letting them see that we're grappling with these important issues is the first step to solving them.
